LETTER FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Families and Students,

Each year begins with great optimism to build on the momentum from the previous year and learn from the lessons of the past year about what to improve. Our District is committed to a culture of continuous improvement, and we hope you embrace that same approach with your children as every year offers an opportunity for them to grow, learn, and improve as students, citizens, leaders, and people.

Detroit Public Schools Community District (DPSCD) is coming off another remarkable year of improvement. Once again, we reached record highs in literacy, mathematics, and P/SAT performance, including the number and percentage of our upperclassmen taking and passing college-ready courses such as Advanced Placement and dual enrollment. We also witnessed strong improvement in the overall District enrollment and student attendance! Each year, DPSCD continues to narrow the gap between the District and State of Michigan averages. Most importantly, our graduation rate has now reached 78%, and it is expected to near the Michigan average of 82% as soon as next year!

Our teachers are leading the way in this improvement, and we are investing in their recruitment and retention through higher salaries and bonuses that have recently made DPSCD the leading school district in the region for teacher retention! Our investments have expanded beyond our teachers, leading to smaller class sizes, special education programs closer to all neighborhoods, more one-on-one support for struggling readers, and improved school buildings. Construction will begin soon for brand-new schools at Pershing and Cody High Schools, a new K-8 in Southwest Detroit, and another new K-8 on the east side. Within the next couple of years, nearly all of our school buildings will have modern air conditioning and heating systems!

As we continue to hear about Federal budget cuts to K-12 education, please know that DPSCD is well prepared to absorb the reduction and protect all staff employment and student programming next year. Our Health Hubs will also continue to be accessible to ALL District families and children to overcome economic challenges that the cuts may bring. This includes free medical, dental, vision, and mental health support, including access to basic needs such as toiletries or non-perishable food. We know these services assist with ensuring your child attends school daily. We must continue to have your partnership to ensure students attend school regularly. We know that when students miss 18 or fewer days of school, they are 3 to 5 times more likely to be at and above grade level in reading and math and to be college-ready.

The upcoming school year will begin on Monday, August 25, 2025. Please print the DPSCD calendar, save the photo in your phone, and make sure you reference key dates, such as parent-teacher conferences, report card distribution, and holiday breaks.

Let's continue to work together to achieve even higher rates of improvement next year as a District and for each of your children!

New students to the district as well as students entering kindergarten or 7th grade are required to be current on their childhood vaccines (i.e., Diphtheria, Tetanus, Pertussis, Polio, Measles, Mumps, Rubella, Hepatitis B, Meningococcal Conjugate, and Chicken Pox). As of the 2024-25 school year, kindergarten students must have an Oral Health Screening on file before entering school. Parents/Guardians who wish to seek a waiver for the required immunizations must make an appointment with the Detroit Health Department at **313-876-4667** prior to enrollment.

PRINCIPAL HIGHLIGHT

MICHELLE DAVIS

Leading with Vision, Soaring with Results

When Principal Michelle Davis walks through the halls of Davis Aerospace Technical High School, she brings more than leadership—she ignites innovation, ambition, and students success. Named the DPSCD 2025 Principal of the Year, Davis has turned vision into action, transforming Davis Aerospace into one of the most celebrated schools in the district.

UNDER HER GUIDANCE, THE SCHOOL YEAR WAS MARKED BY SOARING SUCCESSES:

- Top 5 in Average Daily Attendance Improvement
- Top 5 Most Improved High School Enrollment
- Top 5 in College and Career Course Enrollment and Pass Rates
- Top 5 in Student Loved, Challenged, and Prepared Index Results
- Top 5 in Family Survey Favorability Across K-12
- Top 5 in SAT and PSAT Math Proficiency

But for Davis, leadership is more important than rankings; it's about access and impact. She's known for being hands-on and heart-forward—students know they can reach her, and families feel the doors are always open. That accessibility has helped fuel a culture of pride and purpose.

The school's achievements reflect that energy. Four students passed the FAA Private Pilot's written exam. Adding to the school's aviation legacy, nine students earned their FAA Remote Pilot Certificates—taking their first official step into the skies as certified drone operators. Two student finalists won the 2025 *Ready, Set, Cook!* competition—earning the honor of having their dish served in school cafeterias next year. And the biggest news yet: Davis Aerospace is headed home. After 13 years, the district has announced a \$14.6 million renovation to return the school to Coleman A. Young International Airport, reopening in Fall 2026.

Principal Davis doesn't just lead Davis Aerospace; she charts flight paths for the future generation of aviation students.



WHOLE CHILD SUPPORT

School Counselors play a crucial role in helping students thrive at their best fit school.

- Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) and other topics based on student and school needs

- Collaborate with Positive Behavior Intervention and Support (PBIS) / Climate and Leadership Team (CLT) teams to create a positive educational community
- Conduct wellness checks with families
- Support college and career readiness efforts to prepare students for high school and post-secondary success.
- Partner with Dean/Attendance Agent to provide interventions to improve behavior and attendance

ELEMENTARY AND MIDDLE SCHOOL COUNSELING

Elementary and middle school comprehensive school counseling programs are crafted to equip students with essential skills for success in career exploration, personal growth, interpersonal relationships, and academic achievement. These programs prioritize prevention and early intervention as foundational elements. They utilize various school classrooms, small groups, and individual sessions to support academic, social-emotional, and college/career goals effectively. The primary role of K-8 school counselors is to advocate for students, ensuring they are fully supported and able to actively participate in guidance activities and services.

HIGH SCHOOL COUNSELING

High school comprehensive school counseling builds upon these foundations by offering specialized activities that aid students in identifying, planning, and achieving goals and employment opportunities aligned with their interests, abilities, and needs. Academic planning geared towards college and career readiness is crucial in ensuring all students are prepared for post-secondary education and beyond.

Within DPSCD, school counseling programs are uniquely designed with components such as a counseling curriculum, responsive services, individual planning, and systems of support. This developmental framework provides sequenced activities that evolve with students as they progress through high school, catering to their changing needs and growth stages.

WHOLE CHILD SUPPORT

UNIVERSAL WELLNESS SCREENER

DPSCD developed the Universal Wellness Screener in collaboration with Transforming Research into Action to Improve the Lives of Students (TRAILS). The Screener is administered during the first month of school, and the results provide guidance around services that may be beneficial for students:

TIER 1

Continued participation and engagement with whole school initiatives that promote behavioral health and wellness.

TIER 2

Small group interventions designed to offer prosocial wellness strategies and/or address student concerns. Parental permission may be required for certain Tier 2 behavioral health supports.

**TIER 2
PRIORITY**

Referral for more focused behavioral health services and support. This support includes one-on-one check-ins with a school counselor, school social worker, or other behavioral health provider.

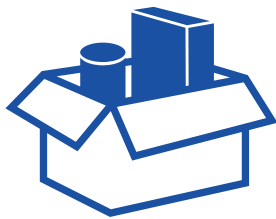

HEALTH HUBS

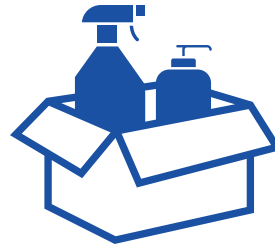

WHOLE CHILD SUPPORT

HEALTH HUB NAVIGATOR SERVICE

Each Health Hub has a dedicated Navigator (a certified Community Health Worker) who connects families to a wide range of school and community resources.

Health Hub Navigator Support Includes:

- **Healthcare Assistance:** Referrals for medical, behavioral health, and dental services (on-site and off-site)
- **Help with Basic Needs:** Access to food, hygiene supplies, and school essentials through the FRDC
- **School-Related Support:** Uniform assistance, transportation for Hub services, and enrollment in school-based programs
- **Personalized Referrals:** Uses the Family Resource Gateway to connect families to services, with follow-up to ensure support
- **Advocacy and Support:** Collaborates with schools, answers family questions, and helps ensure families' voices are heard

STARTING EARLY WITH **PreK**

WHY START EARLY?

The first five years of a child's development are crucial to later success in life. Attending a Pre-Kindergarten (PreK) program will support DPSCD youngest learners with developing critical literacy, language, math, and social-emotional skills prior to entering Kindergarten.

PREK AT DPSCD SCHOOLS

The vision of the Department of Early Learning and Montessori is to provide all PreK students equitable opportunities to explore and engage in diverse, inclusive, high-quality educational experiences through investigation and play, both inside the district and beyond. We strive for early childhood outcomes that include:

- Safe and healthy learning environments
- A high-quality curriculum experience
- Developmentally appropriate practices that meet the individual student needs

DPSCD provides tuition-free, high-quality early learning experiences for students who are 4 years old by December 1, 2025. We currently offer two Pre-Kindergarten programs, Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP) and Montessori.

GREAT START READINESS PROGRAM (GSRP)

GSRP is a state-funded PreK program embedded within elementary schools. Class sizes range from 16 -18 students and classes are held Monday-Friday. The program focuses on whole child development and offers comprehensive support services for enrolled families. To be eligible for the GSRP program, families must meet eligibility guidelines as outlined by the Michigan Department of Lifelong Education, Advancement, and Potential (MILEAP).

MONTESSORI

DPSCD tuition-free PreK-8th grade public Montessori program is dedicated to Montessori philosophy. DPSCD is strongly invested in creating unique, student-centered learning environments and helping families nurture respectful, responsible, and resourceful children. The vision is for all Montessori students to develop independence, critical thinking, ethical behavior, and self-expression needed to thrive as lifelong learners. *Application is required.*

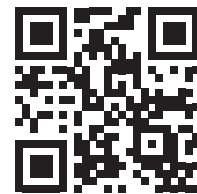

CURRICULUM AND INSTRUCTION

STEM ENRICHMENT

The Office of **Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) Enrichment** focuses on three after-school programs: Academic Games, Chess, and Robotics. All programs are free to students and allow them the opportunity to participate in local, state, and national competitions, pending qualification. DPSCD proudly has state and national leaders amongst our students. Students interested in joining an Academic Games team will learn different games such as Equations, On-Sets, LinguiSHTIK, Propaganda, Presidents, Theme, and Current Events. Students learn how to work collaboratively, plan strategies, and enjoy camaraderie with teammates. The Academic Games season is September-February (local), March (state), and April (nationals). Chess team participants learn the skills needed to not only play chess but to compete with their peers. They learn chess fundamentals and tactics throughout the season. The chess season is September-January (local), February (state) and April-May (nationals). Robotics team participants learn how to work collaboratively while building and coding robots. The robotics season for K-8 students is September-December. Robotics for high schools is from December-March/April. This year, students from Bagley Elementary, Bates Academy, Bunche Preparatory Academy, Chrysler Elementary, Davison Elementary-Middle School, Edison Elementary, Mackenzie Elementary-Middle School, and Renaissance High School were recognized as winners at the state and national levels for Academic Games.

CHESS

In Chess, seven schools qualified for the National Chess Championship: Bates Academy, Bunche Preparatory Academy, Cass Technical High School, Davison Elementary-Middle School, Edmonson Elementary School, Martin Luther King Jr. Senior High School, Renaissance High School, and Sampson-Webber Leadership Academy. Cass Technical High School won the 2025 State High School Chess Championship, and Sampson-Webber Leadership Academy won the 2025 State Jr. High School Chess Championship.

ROBOTICS

The First Lego League elementary teams proudly represented DPSCD at the state competition were The School at Marygrove and Marion Law Academy. The First Tech Challenge middle school teams proudly represented DPSCD at the state Robotics competition. The participating schools included Bethune Academy, Clippert Academy, Foreign Language Immersion and Cultural Studies, and Palmer Park Academy.

ACADEMIC GAMES

At the elementary level, Marion Law Academy and The School at Marygrove Elementary qualified for the state competition. Among high schools, Academy of the Americas High School, Martin Luther King Jr. Senior High School, and The School at Marygrove High School earned their spots as well.

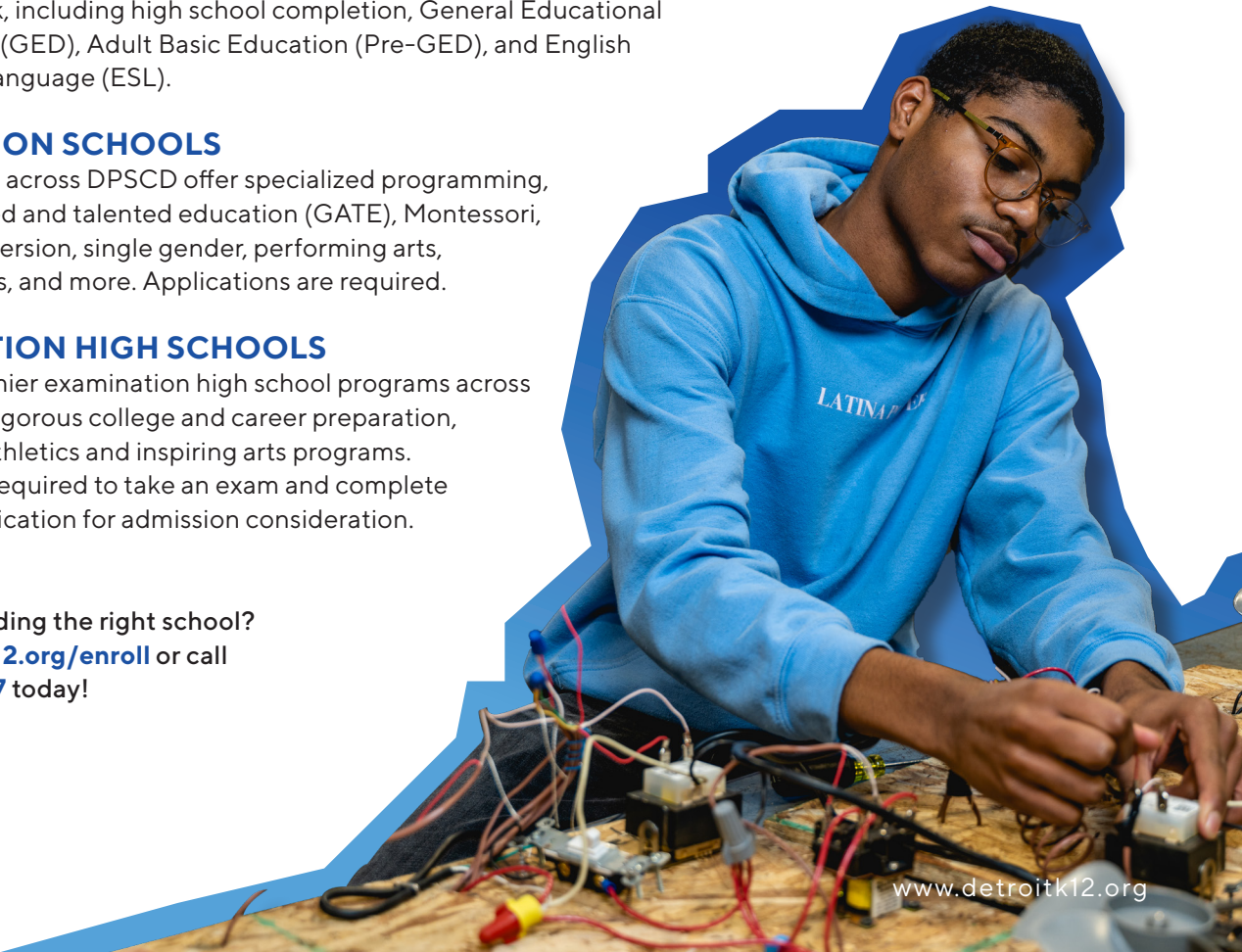

INITIATIVES

PARENT TEACHER HOME VISIT PROJECT (PTHVP)

Closing the gap between parent and teachers immediately positions students to do better in school. PTHVP creates an opportunity for parents to receive visits at home or within the community after school hours. The PTHVP has been proven to increase attendance, academic performance, and positive behavior in school. Participate today to build stronger communication with your students' teachers.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

The Student Leadership Development Program provides students with essential tools to enhance their leadership skills, create experiences that expose them to try new things, and increase their personal development skills. While acquiring new skills and knowledge, students can earn \$25 per course, up to 3 courses each year.

This work includes extended learning experiences for students, staff, families, and community members to build consciousness and community. ENROLLMENT, FAMILY, AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

OFFICE OF HOMELESS AND FOSTER CARE

The Office of Homeless and Foster Care's (OHFC) goal is to identify and support homeless students so they can successfully participate in the learning environment. Students identified as McKinney-Vento eligible will have access to resources available within the DPSCD. These resources are put in place and are essential for students to excel academically and socially.

The Federal Education defines Homelessness as individuals who lack a fixed, regular, adequate nighttime residence, which includes the following living situations:

- Sharing the housing of others due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason.
- Staying in motels, trailer parks, or campgrounds due to the lack of an adequate alternative.
- Staying in shelters or transitional housing; or sleeping in cars, parks, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, or similar settings.
- Is an unaccompanied youth, not in the physical custody of parent or guardian and lives in one of the homeless criteria above.

Students experiencing any of the above living situations have three options to request support from the OHFC:

STUDENT **TECHNOLOGY**

Detroit Public Schools Community District (DPSCD) believes every student deserves access to technology that prepares them for the future. We are proud to provide tools and support that help students learn, create, and stay connected at school and at home.

ONE-TO-ONE STUDENT DEVICES

Every DPSCD student receives a device to support their learning needs:

- **PreK to 2nd Grade: Students receive iPads with age-appropriate apps and features for early learning.**
- **Grades 3 to 12: Students receive HP laptops to help with research, writing, and getting ready for college or careers.**

All student devices are covered by district warranties. Schools also offer a Device Exchange program so students can get a replacement if their device is damaged or not working.



FREE INTERNET ACCESS

Eligible students can receive a free Wi-Fi hotspot to make sure learning continues at home. Contact your school for more information about getting a mobile hotspot.



DIGITAL LEARNING TOOLS

DPSCD uses Microsoft 365 as our main learning platform. Students have access to programs like Word, Excel, PowerPoint, Outlook, and OneDrive to complete assignments and stay organized. Microsoft Teams allows students to join virtual classes, work on group projects, and chat with teachers. Students and families can install Microsoft Office on up to five personal devices for free.

Students can also use other approved learning platforms like Clever and Schoology anytime, anywhere.



MODERN CLASSROOMS

Our classrooms are equipped with interactive Smartboards, document cameras, and displays that make learning exciting and engaging for all students.

TECHNOLOGY SUPPORT

If your child's device or technology isn't working, families can get help through our Customer Care & IT Support services. Contact your school, call the help line, or submit a help desk ticket for quick assistance.



SAFE & SECURE TECHNOLOGY

DPSCD keeps students safe online with advanced internet filters and cybersecurity protections. Student ID cards use secure RFID technology to track device use and support safety on buses and in school buildings.

CREATIVE LEARNING SPACES

REBUILDING DPSCD BRICK BY BRICK

BUILDING A BRIGHTER FUTURE FOR OUR SCHOOLS

The Facilities & Capital Projects teams work tirelessly throughout the year to support the academic journeys of students. DPSCD school buildings are the foundation for academic achievement and success. As a result, DPSCD actively invests in system upgrades and building improvements of over 100+ schools and administrative buildings through Board-approved strategic capital project investments. These major facility investments include but are not limited to the initial Anchor Investments, Facility Master Plan, and special grant-funded investments.

DPSCD's commitment to providing the best learning environments is unwavering, and we are excited to share the progress and plans that transform school facilities.

ANCHOR INVESTMENTS

Dating back to 2018, DPSCD has invested over \$130 million dollars into upgrades, renovations, and building improvements known as Anchor Investments. Funded from the District's surplus operating budget, these investments meet the critical needs of the District schools, above and beyond day-to-day maintenance. Anchor Investments is comprised of over 400 individual projects at schools across the District. As of Summer 2025, we have completed 100% of approved school improvement and repair projects!

FACILITY MASTER PLAN (FMP) INVESTMENTS

The 20-Year Facility Master Plan continues to drive capital improvements across the District.

- Last school year, surrounded by community, students and proud alumni, DPSCD broke ground at the Paul Robeson Malcolm X Academy and Pershing High School future state of the art facilities.
- This Fall, we are on target to welcome students to the new Career Technical Education (CTE) Annex at Southeastern High School. At the beginning of this school year, students will walk through the halls of this all-new facility for the first time! The Southeastern Annex is designed to serve students pursuing careers in advanced manufacturing and industrial welding.
- In Fall 2025, we are looking forward to seeing construction begin at Paul Robeson Malcolm X Academy and Pershing High School new school campus as well as renovations beginning for Davis Aerospace Technical High School's transition back to the Coleman A. Young International Airport.
- This coming 2025-26 school year, DPSCD will break ground at the new Cody High School and the Southwest School construction sites.

CAPITAL INVESTMENTS

The capital investments underscore the commitment to enhancing and providing excellent schools for students and staff. We encourage families to choose schools where we are making significant investments in the future of education.

STUDENT **TRANSPORTATION**

Detroit Public Schools Community District (DPSCD) is committed to providing safe, reliable, and efficient transportation so students can get to and from school each day. Our Division of Student Transportation proudly serves over 13,000 students across the city. We continue to expand transportation options to meet the needs of every family, including students experiencing home displacement. All drivers are fully qualified and trained to ensure student safety.

EXPANDED TRANSPORTATION OPTIONS

To meet the diverse needs of our students, DPSCD offers several transportation services through district vehicles and partnerships with local transportation vendors:

- Yellow bus services
- DDOT bus passes
- District-operated van services
- Locally contracted car services



WHO IS ELIGIBLE FOR TRANSPORTATION?

Student transportation services follow these guidelines:

- **K-8 students who live more than $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile from their neighborhood school.**
- **High school students enrolled in a Career Technical Center (CTC) program at Breithaupt, Golightly, or Randolph receive transportation between their home school and CTC site.**
- **Exceptional education students with required transportation accommodations listed in their Individualized Education Plan (IEP) qualify for services.**
- **Students experiencing homelessness who meet McKinney-Vento Act requirements can also receive transportation services.***

DDOT BUS PASSES

- All high school students (grades 9–12) are eligible for a free 31-day DDOT bus pass each month. Passes can be picked up in the school's main office.
- Students must show both their DDOT bus pass and school-issued Student ID card when boarding the bus.

For students with an IEP, contact the Division of Exceptional Student Education at **(313) 748-6363**.

For students experiencing economic hardship or displacement, contact the Division of Homeless and Foster Care at **(313) 748-6383**.

STUDENT ID CARDS

Student ID cards increase safety by tracking student ridership and supporting school security. Students riding yellow buses or DDOT must scan or show their ID cards when boarding and exiting.

ELEMENTARY & MIDDLE SCHOOL (K–8)

- ID cards are used to track meal counts at breakfast and lunch.
- Students scan their ID cards when entering and exiting yellow buses and district vans.

HIGH SCHOOL

- ID cards are used for meal tracking and to enter school buildings, helping verify enrollment and improve security.
- Students using DDOT buses must show their Student ID along with their DDOT pass.

SCHOOL NUTRITION

The Division of School Nutrition supports the educational development of students by providing a healthy breakfast and hot nutritional lunch to all students in grades K-12 at no charge. On-site preparation ensures that meals are served hot in compliance with federal, state and local health department regulations. All menus adhere to the guidelines of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). The School Nutrition team serves more than 50,000 healthy meals daily through the following programs:

BREAKFAST IN THE CLASSROOM

Breakfast meals are served at the beginning of the school day either in the classroom or the cafeteria.

NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAMS

DPSCD provides free, freshly cooked food items to all students in grades K-12 through modified scratch cooking program, where meals are developed using homestyle cooking techniques, served fresh and hot on-site to students in every school.

SUPPER PROGRAMS

DPSCD offers free, healthy “At-Risk, After-School Supper Programs” throughout the district in support of after-school tutorial and enrichment programs.

SUMMER FOOD SERVICE PROGRAM

This direct meal service program ensures the City of Detroit youth are protected from hunger during the summer.

Note: The menus are free of peanuts and tree nuts, as well as fish and shellfish. If students meet the criteria for disability and require dietary accommodations, a Special Dietary Needs Accommodations Form must be submitted.

The School Nutrition team also operates two Food Trucks during non-inclement weather through a weekly rotation at high schools, special events and district wide events with meals prepared by four District Chefs.

The Farm and Garden Program works to execute the mission to provide high-quality food, nutrition, and wellness education while eliminating barriers to healthy food. Each initiative focuses on connecting students, staff, and community members to local agriculture while empowering them to grow their own food at school or at home.

- Currently 82 DPSCD schools participate in this innovative program, with plans for all schools to receive a garden. Each site features six raised garden beds, built by exceptional DPSCD carpentry students at Charles Drew Transition Center.
- Fruit, vegetables, and edible flowers can be grown in the provided raised beds for use in classroom taste tests, activities, and can even be served as more options in school salad bars.

SCHOOL NUTRITION

Drew Farm is a two-acre farm on the campus of Charles Drew Transition Center, operated by the Division of School Nutrition farm and garden staff.

- The farm has six unheated greenhouses ranging from 3,000 to 4,320 square feet and one and a half acres of field production space.
- On average, 20,000 pounds of fresh, organically produced food are grown for the school lunch program. The crop plan is aligned with district menus and salad bars to optimize usage.
- Drew Farm is the center piece of the school garden program and was designed as a replicable model to increase house food production district wide.
- School Nutrition staff often host field trips and community events for students and DPSCD families to learn about local agriculture, healthy eating, and sustainability at Drew Farm.

TEACHER HIGHLIGHT

DR. MIA ROLLACK

Empowering Readers, One Page at a Time

For Dr. Mia A. Rollack, teaching English Language Arts at Pulaski Elementary-Middle School isn't just her job—it's her passion. Over the past six years, she has become a cornerstone of the school's 7th and 8th grade team, known for her unwavering dedication, compassionate teaching style, and deep roots in DPSCD.

A proud product of DPSCD herself, Dr. Rollack's path to the classroom began at Crockett Technical High School, now known as Crockett Midtown High School for Science and Medicine. It was there that inspiring teachers lit the spark that led her to pursue a career in education—a full-circle moment she now passes on to her own students.

One of Dr. Rollack's most powerful teaching moments came when she connected an eighth-grade student with a love of baseball to reading. The student, once reading at a 5th-grade level, found motivation and confidence through sports-themed books. Years later, he earned a full-ride scholarship to the University of Michigan for baseball—a real-life example of what happens when literacy meets passion.

"It doesn't matter the reading level," says Dr. Rollack. **"What matters is what they are reading to inspire them to want to read."**



Students regularly echo how her messages of perseverance and effort—**"I'm not asking you to be perfect; I'm asking you to try"**—have motivated them to aim higher and push through challenges. Her classroom is not just a place for lessons but a safe space for growth.

That impact has not gone unnoticed. This last school year, Dr. Rollack was named the 2025 Teacher of the Year, a reflection of her extraordinary ability to transform lives through education. As she puts it, **"I really want to make a difference in a positive way, in their lives, with their education."**

With every book opened and every word written, Dr. Rollack continues to ignite a love for learning that students carry far beyond the classroom.

DPSCD COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

The Office of Government and Community Affairs (GCA) looks to build and improve public schools through community engagement and legislative advocacy. Schools in Detroit have access to fewer resources and funding compared to more affluent areas. As a result, schools in Detroit receive less funding per pupil. Furthermore, Detroit receives \$2,511 less in unrestricted funding per pupil, which equates to over \$125 Million.

The GCA team monitors state and federal legislation relevant to K-12 education in Detroit. Some of these legislative policies include equitable state school aid, teacher salaries, recruitment and retention, whole child/mental health supports, and funding school facility improvements.

GCA works to engage all members of the community. The numerous ways this is achieved is through establishing relationships with local businesses, neighborhood associations, and non-profit organizations. The GCA team collaborates with various departments on community outreach. GCA recruits, identifies, and trains Community Engagement Leaders (CELs) to assist in “spreading the good news” happening in and around DPSCD and presenting the district legislative agenda to community and elected stakeholders. CELs also attend events and meetings to serve as advocates within the community and the District.

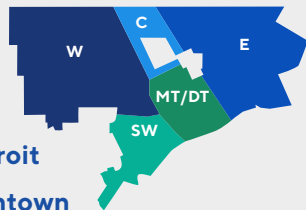

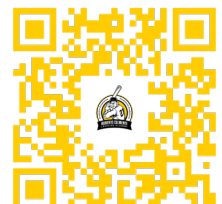

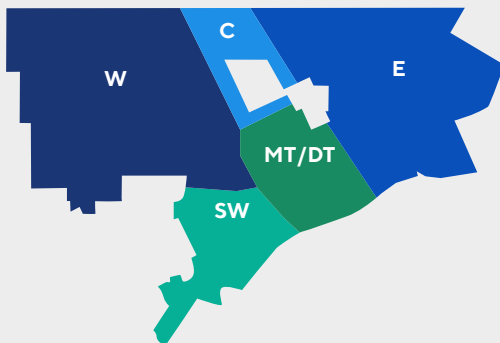
