VACCINE REQUIREMENTS

New students, Kindergarten and 7th-grade students must be up-to-date on childhood vaccines (Diphtheria, Tetanus, Pertussis, Polio, Measles, Mumps, Rubella, Hepatitis B, Meningococcal Conjugate, Chicken Pox). Starting 2024-25, Kindergarten students must also have an Oral Health Assessment before entering school.

LETTER FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Families and Students,

Thank you for your continued commitment to Detroit Public Schools Community District (DPSCD). We are proud of your decision to continue to choose DPSCD as the education option for your child's academic and social success considering the various options you have to educate your child. At DPSCD, we are excited to announce another opportunity to increase teacher salaries this fall! Our latest agreement with the Detroit Federation of Teachers will now place DPSCD in a more competitive advantage to recruit and retain the most dedicated, experienced, and talented teachers in the area. This certainly separates DPSCD from other education options in the area. We know that one of the



best investments that we can make in our students is through their teachers because they are the ones who work directly with your child on a day-to-day basis. This is why we are committed to employing teachers who are only certified or actively working toward their certification.

Our investment in teachers has led to notable improvements in student achievement. Since the pandemic, the DPSCD has eliminated aggregate learning loss from the pandemic in both literacy and mathematics. Our performance in literacy, mathematics, and the P/SAT has reached its highest levels in the District's history. In fact, our improvement since the pandemic outpaces city charters, state averages, and county averages. DPSCD is one of the most improved large urban school districts in the country.

DPSCD will receive additional funding over the next three years through the literacy lawsuit settlement. These funds will be used to reduce class sizes in K-3, hire more Academic Interventionists to work one-on-one with students performing below grade level, and provide each DPSCD parent with free online literacy tutoring for their students after school. The District will also continue to offer after school tutoring for literacy and math after school. Summer school will also be available at no cost to families next summer.

As we continue to improve student achievement, we must improve student attendance and overall climate and culture. We know that if students miss fewer than 9 days of school, then they are 3 to 5 times more likely to be at or above grade level in literacy, math, and to be college ready as defined by the P/SAT. The District has used philanthropic funding to expand Health Hubs and Family Resource Centers across the city to provide students and families with free access to basic medical, dental, and mental health services to all families and offer benefits such as food pantries, eviction support, and legal services. This is to address many of the causes of student absenteeism. While better supporting our families and students, we will be increasing accountability for poor attendance. Starting next year, if students miss more than 45 days of school without extending circumstances, then they will be subject to retention and/or required to attend their neighborhood school to improve access to transportation.

To also improve the experiences of our students, families, and staff we will be placing extra attention on climate and culture. We all need to be more sensitive and conscious of how we are interacting with each other with extra respect, patience, professionalism, and understanding. We want everyone to feel more loved, challenged, and prepared, especially our students. Schools will have more funding to offer more "fun" activities for students and more team building exercises for staff. The District is also actively working to implement a trauma-informed curriculum for all schools and grade levels in 2025-26. This will assist our students and staff to work toward breaking the cycle of harm. We will also continue to fund and provide all of our schools with expanded mental health support for all students. This is something we look to expand to our employees as well next year.

The upcoming school year will begin on Monday, August 26, 2024. Please make sure you print and save the DPSCD calendar to reference key dates, such as parent teacher conferences, report card distribution, and holiday breaks.

Parent Teacher Home Visit Project (PTHVP)

Bridging the gap between parents and teachers helps students thrive. PTHVP offers home or community visits outside school hours, proven to boost attendance, academic performance, and positive behavior. Get involved today to strengthen communication with your child's teacher.

Student Leadership Development Program

The Student Leadership Development Program provides students with essential tools to enhance their leadership and personal development skills through hands-on experiences. Participants can explore new opportunities while earning \$25 per course, up to 4 courses per year.

Faith-Based Partnerships

The Faith-Based Initiative brings together faith organizations to support students and families through mentorship, volunteer efforts, donations, and more. Recognizing the vital role of faith communities, this partnership strengthens the "village" that helps students succeed.

School Advisory Councils

The School Advisory Council (SAC) is a 19-member group at each school, made up of school leadership, staff, parents, students, and community members. Their goal is to implement the school improvement plan, with a focus on reducing chronic absenteeism by identifying and removing barriers to daily attendance.







Parents Are Heroes Conference

This conference celebrates the vital role parents play in shaping students' lives. Parents can reconnect, meet new friends, and learn best practices for modern parenting. Workshops address topics like discipline, social media, setting goals, managing stress, and living a healthy lifestyle, all based on areas of concern raised by parents.

Student Empowerment Experience

Organized by the District's Executive Youth Council, this conference empowers young leaders from DPSCD high schools through inspiring courses in a fun, uplifting environment. The event is designed to motivate and equip students with the tools to lead effectively.

Join our annual summer event to prevent learning loss! Students, families, and the community are invited for a day of fun activities, educational resources, and connections with district partners. Enrolled families receive bridge books, enjoy music, food, ice cream, and participate in workshops. New families can also attend to get enrollment guidance.

ELEMENTARY & MIDDLE SCHOOL COUNSELING

Counselors engage students through classroom, small group, and individual sessions to support academic, social-emotional, and college/career goals. Comprehensive programs focus on career exploration, personal growth, relationships, and academic achievement, emphasizing prevention and early intervention. Streamlined administrative duties allow K-8 counselors to focus on interactive guidance activities and services.

HIGH SCHOOL COUNSELING

Building on earlier foundations, high school counseling helps students plan for their future by aligning goals with their interests and abilities. Academic planning for college and career readiness ensures students are prepared for post-secondary success.

UNIVERSAL WELLNESS SCREENING (FALL SURVEY)

Developed in partnership with TRAILS (Transforming Research into Action to Improve the Lives of Students), the Universal Wellness Screener is administered during the fall to guide recommendations on student support services based on results:



Continued engagement with school-wide mental health initiatives.

Small group interventions addressing specific concerns, following the Cognitive Behavioral Therapy(CBT) model. Parental permission required.

Referrals for more intensive behavioral health services, with one-on-one support from counselors, social workers, or behavioral health providers.

Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP)

GSRP is a state-funded Pre-K program within elementary schools, offering classes Monday-Thursday for 16-18 students. It focuses on whole child development and provides support services for families. Eligibility is based on income guidelines set by the Michigan Department of Lifelong Education, Advancement, and Potential.

STEM ENRICHMENT



The Office of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) Enrichment offers three free after-school programs: Academic Games, Chess, and Robotics. These programs provide students the chance to participate in local, state, and national competitions. DPSCD proudly has national leaders in these areas.

ACADEMIC GAMES

Students engage in games like Equations, On-Sets, LinguiSHTIK, Propaganda, Presidents, Theme, and Current Events. They build teamwork by working collaboratively, develop strategy through planning, and enjoy camaraderie with their peers. The season runs from September to February (local), March (state), and April (nationals).

CHESS

Students learn chess fundamentals and tactics, competing with their peers. The season is September to March (local) and April to May (nationals).

ROBOTICS

Students learn how to work collaboratively while building robots. The K-8 season runs from September to December, and the high school season is December to March/April.

ROBOTICS

A record number of middle schools, including Academy of the Americas, Bates Academy, Clippert Multicultural Magnet Honors Academy, Davison Elementary-Middle School, Durfee Elementary-Middle School, Foreign Language Immersion and Cultural Studies School, Golightly Education Center, and Palmer Park Preparatory Academy, qualified for the state competition. Additionally, three high schools—Martin Luther King Jr. Senior High School, Renaissance High School and The School at Marygrove—qualified.

FINE AND PERFORMING ARTS

The Office of Fine and Performing Arts provides equitable opportunities for K-12 students to develop lifelong skills in dance, visual art, theater, and music. Our programs unlock student potential by connecting them with meaningful, student-centered college and career opportunities through the rich arts resources and instructors in Detroit.

Through the District's Cultural Passport program, a partnership with arts organizations, students visit cultural institutions like the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, Detroit Opera, and Detroit Institute of Arts. These experiences enrich students, fostering creative thought and holistic development.

DPSCD students have showcased their talents at major events, including the NFL Draft, An Evening of Fine Arts at the Fox Theatre, and the DPSCD Art Exhibition at the DIA.

NFL DRAFT

DPSCD's All-City Marching Band was front and center, performing at Hart Plaza and participating in the event's theatre experience. Throughout the city, DPSCD ensembles—including choirs, bands, and dance companies performed weekly at On the Clock events, entertaining the community at recreation centers and Corner Ballpark in the leadup to the draft.

ART EXHIBITION AT THE DIA

In DPSCD's longest-running partnership with the Detroit Institution of Art (DIA), K-12 students get to showcase 200+ of their own artworks, nearly 1000 pieces are submitted and selected by a jury of DPSCD art educators and DIA staff. The exhibition features a wide range of mediums, including ceramics, painting, drawing, sculpture, photography, digital art, and more.

AN EVENING OF FINE ARTS (EFA)

An adjudicated event, EFA showcases 650+ of DPSCD's top visual and performing artists, celebrating their talent and achievements. As the culminating event of the fine arts school year, EFA highlights the tremendous growth and development of student talent across the district.

STUDENT TRANSPORTATION

DPSCD' Office of Student Transportation (OST) is committed to providing safe, efficient, and reliable transportation for 12,000-13,000 students each year. All yellow bus drivers must pass background checks, hold a commercial driver's license (CDL), and undergo random drug testing.

EXPANDING TRANSPORTATION SERVICES

DPSCD utilizes a multi-modal system, including school buses, small vehicles, District-owned vans, and free DDOT bus passes for eligible students. This expanded transportation ensures safe, dependable options for every eligible student, regardless of their needs or circumstances.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE FOR TRANSPORTATION SERVICES:

K-8

DPSCD offers transportation to K-8 students in standard education who live more than 3/4 of a mile from their neighborhood school.

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS (GRADES 9-12)

Students are eligible for a free 31-day DDOT pass each month, available at their home school office. Students must show their DPSCD-issued ID to the bus operator. Contact your school's office for questions about student IDs and DDOT passes.

EXCEPTIONAL EDUCATION STUDENTS

Transportation is provided if required by the student's Individualized Education Plan (IEP). Parents and caregivers of students with an IEP may contact the **Exceptional Student Education Department's** enrollment office at **313-748-6363** regarding transportation related IEP concerns.

CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION STUDENTS (CTE)

Transportation is available for students traveling between their high school and Career and Technical Center.

SCHOOL NUTRITION

The Office of School Nutrition (OSN) provides free, healthy meals to all K-12 students, serving over 50,000 meals daily. All meals meet USDA guidelines and are prepared on-site to ensure quality.

PROGRAMS OFFERED

BREAKFAST IN THE CLASSROOM

Breakfast is served at the start of the day in classrooms or cafeterias.

NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

Free, freshly cooked meals are provided daily through a modified scratch cooking program.

SUPPER PROGRAMS

Free, healthy meals are offered after school in support of tutorial and enrichment programs.

SUMMER FOOD SERVICE PROGRAM

Ensures Detroit youth have access to meals during the summer months.

SCHOOL NUTRITION SAFETY & INNOVATIONS

All menus are free of peanuts, tree nuts, fish, and shellfish. For students with disabilities requiring dietary accommodations, a Special Dietary Needs Accommodations Form must be submitted.

FOOD TRUCKS

OSN operates two food trucks during non-inclement weather, rotating weekly to high schools and district events. Meals are prepared by the District's chefs.

FARM AND GARDEN PROGRAM

The Farm and Garden Program connects students and the community to local agriculture, empowering them to grow their own food at school or home. Currently, 82 schools participate, with plans to expand. Each site includes six raised garden beds built by DPSCD carpentry students, growing fruits, vegetables, and edible flowers for classroom use or school salad bars.

DREW FARM

Located at Charles Drew Transition Center, Drew Farm spans two acres and features six greenhouses, in addition to field production space. Producing 20,000 pounds of organic food annually, the farm aligns its crops with district menus and salad bars. It serves as the centerpiece of the school garden program and a replicable model for district-wide food production.

OSN also hosts field trips and community events to teach students and families about local agriculture, healthy eating, and sustainability.

FACILITIES & OPERATIONS

FACILITY UPGRADES: BUILDING A BRIGHTER FUTURE

We're excited to share updates on significant facility upgrades that will enhance learning environments across the District.

20-YEAR FACILITY MASTER PLAN (FMP) AND ANCHOR INVESTMENTS

Our 20-Year Facility Master Plan continues to drive improvements. Spring 2024, we broke ground on a Career Technical Education (CTE) Annex for Southeastern High School, set to open in Fall 2025, focusing on advanced manufacturing careers. We are also working on new builds for Pershing, Carstens, Paul Robeson/Malcolm X, Cody, and renovations at Davis Aerospace at Coleman A. Young Airport, with community input and updates scheduled for this fall.





SUMMER 2024 PROJECTS

This summer, construction has been underway at several schools, including Academy of the Americas at Logan, Bates, Burton, Henderson, JR King, and Mann. Projects focus on pavement, HVAC, building automation, electrical updates, exterior improvements, and fencing repairs. As construction begins for the new Paul Robeson/Malcolm X, the school will temporarily move to the former CMA building at 14771 Mansfield Street. Transportation will be provided from the current site for the 2024–2025 school year.

DPSCD COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

The Office of Government and Community Affairs (GCA) strengthens public schools through community engagement and legislative advocacy. Detroit schools receive less funding per pupil compared to wealthier areas, including \$2,511 less in unrestricted funds, totaling a difference of over \$125 million.



GCA monitors, city, state, and federal legislation on issues like equitable school aid, teacher salaries, retirement, mental health support, and education policy. They engage the community by building relationships with local businesses, associations, and nonprofits, and collaborate on outreach efforts.

GCA also recruits and trains Community Engagement Leaders (CELs) to share positive news, promote the district's legislative agenda, and advocate at events and meetings.

PRINCIPAL SPOTLIGHT

TYRA SMITH BELL

Q: How do you promote good attendance in your school?

A: At our school, attendance is part of our positive Climate and Culture. Every morning, we kick off with our "Attendance Matters" segment during the school-wide Morning Meeting. Our Attendance Agent, DelMarie Smith-Carr, shares the previous day's attendance using a data bar graph, and students treat it like a fun competition everyone's aiming for 90% or higher!

We've also made attendance fun with our Race for Attendance board in the hallway. Each homeroom has a racecar that moves based on their weekly attendance, and the winning class gets rewarded. It's a playful way to encourage teamwork and accountability, and students love cheering on their class!

Teachers stay connected by calling home when students are absent, and parents actually appreciate the check-ins, knowing it's a chance for us to offer support. Whether it's transportation or uniforms, we work together to make sure students have what they need to succeed. By creating this collaborative environment, we make attendance something to look forward to, rather than just a requirement.

Q: How do you address attendance barriers with your families?

A: Many of our students dealing with chronic absenteeism live outside our school's boundaries, so we help them transfer smoothly to a school closer to home when necessary. For our McKinney-Vento families, the Office of Homelessness steps in, providing transportation through Uber or buses. We even have a washer and dryer on campus for cleaning uniforms, as well as plenty of extra uniforms for families facing financial difficulties.

For new students who might feel anxious about starting at a new school, we offer Peer-Buddies to help them get comfortable with the campus and our procedures. In some cases, administrators have even personally picked up or dropped off students to ensure they get to school safely when transportation is an issue.



Q: Can you share a student success story that impacted their academic achievement?

A: One special student has been with us since the 2016-2017 school year and struggled with attendance for quite some time. Last year, as a sixth-grader, he made significant improvements in both attendance and academics. In fifth grade, he was failing several subjects, but by the end of sixth grade, I'm proud to say he didn't receive any failing grades at all!

This turnaround came through a strong partnership between the school, the student, and his family. Thanks to his progress, he was able to join both the basketball and track teams, which further boosted his confidence and success.
