## **Daily Class Schedule**

#### TSM operates on a **Block schedule**.

- Students will attend four 85-minute classes on Mondays & Thursdays (Cycle B days) and four 85-minute classes on Tuesdays & Fridays (Cycle C days).
- On Wednesdays (Cycle A day), they will attend all eight (8) classes (40-minutes ea.).
- There will be a 45-minute lunch period every day, Monday-Friday.
- Passing time between classes is 5 minutes.
- Student will not have lockers in semester 1.

# Pickup/ Dropoff

## FOR PARENTS & STUDENTS

- 1.Enter The School at Marygrove Campus through the entrance on 6 Mile/McNichols Rd
- 2. Proceed to the security booth to have their parking pass verified (this will not happen the 1st day)
- 3. Drivers will then make a right turn and proceed to the end of the circle driveway and and as far towards the 6 Mile/McNichols RD exit as possible
- 4. Drivers will not stop to pick up or drop off students in the two lanes in front of the building if there is space available further down
- 5. Drivers will park and along the edge of the driveway while their student exits the vehicle during drop off or while waiting for the student to walk to the vehicle for pick up
- 6.Drivers will then proceed towards the 6 Mile/McNichols RD exit and wait for the mechanical arm to rise
- 7. Drivers must exit one at a time to avoid damage to the mechanical arm or their vehicle
- 8. Drivers shall not attempt to make a left hand turn while exiting the campus. This will cause severe traffic backups due to the new traffic pattern and construction traffic

# Parking

## FOR PARENTS & STUDENTS

Please <u>complete this form</u> by 09:00 AM on Tuesday, September 7th in order to have your parking pass issued at the end of the first day of school. Families who complete the form after the deadline will have their parking passes issued throughout the week. Huskies, please read and observe the parking, pick up, and drop off procedures detailed below.

Each family will only be issued 2 parking passes for the school year.

#### Student Parking

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- Students will park in the lot near the exit gate at 6 Mile/McNichols RD and walk to the Liberal Arts Building
- There are no exceptions to this policy
- Under no circumstances are students to park in any of the lots or spaces adjacent to or near the liberal arts building
- Under no circumstances are students to park in the lots reserved for ECE staff, families, or visitors
- Under no circumstances are students to park in the reserved visitor spots in front of the security booth
- Students must have a DPSCD parking permit from The Marygrove Conservancy in order to park their vehicle on campus
- Students are not allowed to leave campus for lunch or any other reason outside of dismissal or to attend dual enrollment classes
- Students will get 2 warnings for parking and driving violations before their driving/parking permission are suspended or revoked permanently
- Students will not play excessively loud and explicit music while driving on campus
- Student vehicles on campus are subject to ticketing and towing for not following signs posted around campus
- Students will not play excessively loud and explicit music while driving on campus



#### 1. Once an asymptomatic student has tested positive for COVID-19, what is the protocol for other students? Principal White or the DPSCD will handle the communications in such an event.

- 2. If a student tests positive for COVID-19, can they move to virtual school? There is a process for students being moved to virtual. If a student tests positive test for COVID-19, they will not be moved to virtual.
- 3. Will students be expected to work from home if they are sick with COVID-19, even if they asymptomatic? There is not an expectation for students to work from home if they were sick. We are not in a place to judge student's symptoms.
- 4. Can students wear hoodies from last year? Do the hoodies need the TSM logo? Hoodies are out of dress code district wide and at The School at Marygrove. Hoodies or other apparel that is out of dress code that has our school logo still cannot be work to school.
- 5. Can students wear solid colored flannel shirts? Students can wear any material top if it is solid navy, grey, white, or gold. Patterns (i.e., a checkered flannel) and other designs are not allowed.
- 6. Do our uniform shirts need to have the TSM logo? No, we do not expect or require students to wear polos with the school logo; they can wear plain polos, or polos with small emblems.
- 7. Can we wear a gold TSM collared shirt? Yes.
- 8. Can students bring snacks since lunch is later in the day?
- 9. Students can bring their own breakfast, lunch, and snacks. Generally, students are not permitted to eat in classrooms or during lessons.
- 10. We are a peanut-free school. Please do not send your students with anything that has peanuts.
- 11. Will students be allowed to eat lunch outdoors? No. Students have two designated dining areas. The 3rd floor common area and the Alumni Hall in the Madame Cadillac Building.
- 12. What is the Hatteras contact information? At this time the Hatteras store link has not been established by the vendor. We are in constant communication with the supplier and the link will be sent out via email and robocall once available.
- 13. Will we have a dance, a junior prom, and other events? School-wide events will be dependent on the COVID-19 pandemic. With current social distancing and occupancy limits, a school-wide event is not possible.
- 14. Can tutoring happen during lunch? Students are allowed to make arrangements with teachers, however teachers are not required to tutor during lunch, before or after school.
- 15. What time must students be out of the building? Students must exit the building when they are dismissed at 4:00pm. Hallways will be cleared at 4:15pm.
- 16. Will students be asked to leave the building if I cannot get to the school at dismissal? Please communicate with the office if emergencies arise. No student will be left unattended on campus. We will work together to make sure this does not become a pattern.
- 17. Will we have a chance to meet the underclassmen? Yes.

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18. Do we have to show proof of religious or cultural reason to wear a head covering? Who approves head coverings? Please contact Dean Watts (donald.watts@detroitk12.org) with questions about specific head coverings. The DPSCD code of conduct is the policy that dictate what headwear is and is not allowed in schools.



19. Should students back their school laptop on the first day of school (Tues, Sep. 7)? Students will not need laptops the first week of school. Technology (Teams, PowerSchool, laptops, etc.) will be discussed during the first week of school.

20. What do I need to know about student parking?

a. Students need to check in with Dean Watts regarding parking and permits. We are asking for students not to drive the first weeks of school due to spacing and logistics.

b. Students will be required to submit a parking pass application to the Marygrove Conservancy.

i. Students will receive the parking pass form via email

c. Students will park in the lot near the exit gate and walk to the Liberal Arts Building

i. Under no circumstances are students to park in any of the lots or spaces adjacent to or near the liberal arts building

ii. Under no circumstances are students to park in the lots reserved for ECE staff, families, or visitors

iii. Under no circumstances are students to park in the reserved visitor spots in front of the guard shack

d. Parking is first come first serve for students in the lot near the exit

i. Construction will still be ongoing I believe so students will have limited parking options

ii. Campus events will still be occurring year round

e. Students must have a DPSCD parking permit from The Marygrove Conservancy in order to park their vehicle on campus

i. Students will complete the same parking pass form as staff

ii. Front office staff to create spreadsheet that contains all student license plate numbers

f. Students are not allowed to leave campus for lunch or any other reason outside of dismissal

g. Students will get 2 warnings for violations before their driving/parking permission are suspended or revoked permanently

h. Student vehicles on campus are subject to ticketing and towing for not following posted signs on campus

21. If another student travels with me on the day I have dual enrollment, will they be allowed to leave to campus me?

a. Only students actively enrolled in dual enrollment classes will be released from campus. Students who may have carpooled will have to make separate travel arrangements for dismissal

22. If students are arriving at 8:15am or shortly after, are they encouraged to eat breakfast?

a. Students will be encouraged to eat breakfast but are not required to.

23. My student has an IEP (or 504 Plan). How do I start the process of making sure they receive accommodations? Ms. S. Williams will reach out to all families with students of an IEP, Ms. Adams will reach out to all families with 504's. This will happen after the first couple of weeks of school starting.

### **9TH GRADE PROGRAM**

This program involves monthly visits to the University of Michigan for hands-on experiences, including healthcare panels, surgical skills sessions, and clinical shadowing.

Students are paired with first year medical students for a year-long mentorship experience.

Students complete a health-related social issues capstone project in partnership with a community organization.

### **RISING PROGRAM**

Our second branch is for 10th-12th grade students as a continuation of our longitudinal mentorship program.

In this program students focus on professional development and college readiness.

Medical student lead students through several sessions, including personal statement workshops, financial aid talks, college application support, and community service events.

### SUCCEED PROGRAM



Our third branch is for DoT alumnae who have matriculated to the University of Michigan.

This curriculum involves weekly study tables, game nights, graduate school panels, clinical skills workshops, and various scholarship opportunities.

## **Detroit Horse Power**

Detroit Horse Power is an organization that teaches urban youth to ride and care for horses as a way to develop critical skills that will set them up for future success.

Detroit Horse Power is recruiting students for their after-school program. Programming starts October 11. Spaces are limited and filled on a first-come, first-served basis.
