Growing up as an only child with her mom, Mrs. Moore loved to dance and write poetry. She studied dance at the Alvin Ailey dance center for 10-years while attending high school and undergrad in college and has published her poetry and plays online under a pen-name.

As she continued her education, she became passionate about how people in her community had less access to healthy lifestyle options. She realized either they were not told they had better options or they simply didn't question what was available to them only seeing liquor convenience stores in their neighborhood- *bodegas* as they call them in New York. So, she went on to join New York's Public Interest Research Group under the education and public health sectors. There she fought for healthier options to be offered to students and staff on campus, enhance visibility to mental and physical health resources in her community in the Bronx, and published research around "food deserts" for CUNY Graduate University before she even finished her bachelor's degree.

Even though she graduated with a Bachelor's in Fine Arts for writing, she pursued and completed a Master's in Childhood Education, before becoming a teacher full time. She hopes to share time with and embolden the most interesting and powerful people on earth- KIDS. She has a daughter of her own as well who will be 4-years old on June 16th!

In addition to being Gardner's English Master Teacher (or instructional coach) and 5th Grade teacher, she writes for Visit Detroit magazine and website for fun and currently works with institutions like the DIA and Michigan Council for Social Studies to help write more diverse curriculum for teachers and students to enjoy. I have always enjoyed helping children learn and reach for the stars and moon. All diamonds start off as a rock and are pressed until the beauty from within shines through.

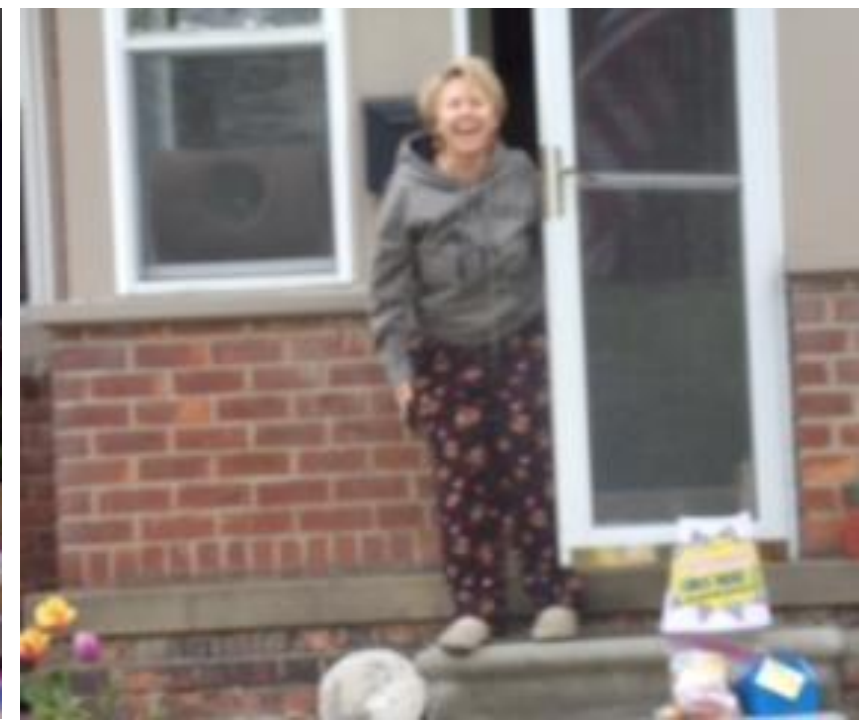


Ms. Cummings
