CAREER CONVERSATIONS AT HOME

In our last edition, we shared numerous summer camp opportunities for students. We wanted to continue that discussion and share additional career readiness options. Many are free and require minimal investment of time. In addition, they offer chances for students to learn more about themselves, understand the world of work, connect to community resources, and continue career conversations at home. As you continue to work on your summer planning, consider some of the following activities to help continue both career exploration and career development:

<u>Virtual or In Person Field Trips/ College Visits</u>: Consider scheduling an in person or virtual trip to a local college, training center, or museum for a day dedicated to learning. Check out <u>YouVisit.com</u> for a listing of virtual college tours. Feel free to call local museums or visit their websites for visit information.

<u>Online Career Focused Groups</u> (Twitter, Instagram, Facebook, or Youtube) There are many groups, pages, or blogs dedicated to a specific career fields. Following or joining a page is an easy way for students to learn about a day in the life of a particular profession, get connected with a professional, and organizations of support.

<u>Taking college classes in the summer</u> Many colleges open their doors to younger students for enrichment opportunities during the summer months. Teens may decide to take an advanced math course or explore coursework that's not available at their local high school. Some high schools may give students credit for this coursework, but speak with your child's counselor to confirm.

<u>Informational Interviews</u> give us an opportunity to talk with professionals about the work they do and learn more about both their educational and professional path. Talking with neighbors, relatives, and family friends about their work will give students a head start and a better understanding of the world of work. Here are some sample <u>Questions To Ask During An Informational Interview</u>. Your child may want to select a few of them for a 30 minute informational meeting.

WELLNESS CORNER: DON'T BE AFRAID TO MOVE FORWARD

It's understandable that there may be some nervousness or fear, but it doesn't have to be debilitating. You are not alone on an island, you are surrounded by opportunities to connect with others for support, social development, skill development, and so much more. Here are some tips for entering your next chapter, with calm, confidence, and ease:

- 1. Check emails often and respond in a timely manner. Institutions are still using email correspondence as their primary way to communicate. Whether it's from an employer or instructor, you may miss opportunities which can even be costly. Get into the habit of reading your emails at the same time, every day.
- 2. Sign up for any digital newsletters and follow the organization on social media. Activities, meetings, events, and other opportunities to meet new people are usually posted online. Being aware of events will offer opportunities to learn more about the organization and connect with others with similar interests and goals.
- **3.Get familiar with resources.** New employees may review the employee handbook and talk with human resources about staff supports and benefits. New students, could visit the campus welcome center, financial aid office, admissions office, or career center. An answer is a phone call, step, or email away. Student services can also prove beneficial. Some postsecondary institutions offer tutoring, proofreading, counseling, computer access, exercise space, printing and additional services for students.
- **4.** Use a planner early and often. Staying organized is essential as you embark on adulthood. Writing down deadlines, creating a daily to-do list, and completing those tasks could help reduce anxiety and help improve confidence in a new setting.
- **5. Stay Connected with Supportive Family and Friends**. Staying connected with family and friends can provide a source of support during adjustments. They will enjoy learning about new adventures and be able to offer a listening ear and advice, when needed.

CELEBRATE PROFESSIONAL TRADES MONTH







May is Professional Trades Month in Michigan. Many businesses require highly skilled workers to fill a multitude of trades in health care, construction, manufacturing and service industries. We rely on these professionals to fix our cars, install plumbing, build our homes, draw our blood, and make sure our computer networks run efficiently. Many of these in-demand jobs do not require a four-year degree; some short-term certifications take less than a year to complete. Professional trades will account for nearly 530,000 jobs in the Michigan economy through 2028, and approximately 47,000 job openings are expected annually in the state during this time.

Professional Trades offer a chance for high-skill, high-paid jobs within in-demand career fields. Resources like Going PRO in Michigan and the Wayne RESA Workforce Development Initiative's Database highlight short-term certifications and stackable credentials. They not only prepare students to be successful in the professional trades, they guide them towards realistic, obtainable first steps towards a successful, high-paid career.

POSTSECONDARY SUCCESS TIPS: JOB SEARCH SUCCESS

If you're looking to start your job search for the summer, in between high school and college, or you're looking for that first professional role, there are several great steps that you can take to increase your chances of success. Here are three:

Write A Quality Resume

Your resume is your professional marketing document. It provides a summary of your knowledge, skills and experience. As a high school graduate, quantity is far less important than quality. It's understandable to not have a lot of work experience at 18 years old. You still want good content. You will want to create sections for education, skills, work experience, and extracurricular activities. It's important to include anything you've done that can help an employer see your work ethic, knowledge, skills, and value.

SUCCESS TIPS: Whenever you're actively applying for employment and sending resumes online take the extra step to customize the resume to the position. Build the resume using an ATS-friendly (resume reading software) template such as those offered by <u>Jobscan</u>. Try to incorporate the skills and qualities they're requesting in the resume. Lastly, always proofread for errors. Utilize free resume review services like that of <u>Get Schooled</u>.

Begin Networking

The fastest way into your next role is not a job board, believe it or not. It comes through a conversation with someone of influence. Research shows that about <u>85% of jobs are filled through networking</u>. So what is networking? Simply put, it is building relationships that can lead to career opportunities.

SUCCESS TIPS: Write down everyone you know and begin reaching out to them, informing them of your upcoming job search. They may be willing to introduce you to their contacts, who may have great job leads. Lastly, join a professional networking platform, like <u>LinkedIn</u>, to find great people in your area who are in the roles you aspire to be in.

Tap Into Free Resources


Throughout Wayne County there are many great skill-building and job search resources. So many students have access to incredible free services through their local Michigan Works Office or your local library.

FINANCIAL AID NEWS FOR JUNIORS

It's time for our juniors to get a head start on their financial aid planning. Here are some steps recommended for rising seniors and their families:

- **CREATE AN FSA ID** Your FSA ID acts as a username and password for your financial aid application. Separate FSA IDs are required for parents/guardians and students. Go here to create your FSA ID and store it in a safe place.
- Curious about how much financial aid assistance your student could be eligible for? Use the <u>Federal Student Aid Estimator</u> to estimate your student's financial aid.
- ADD OCTOBER 1st to your calendar. This is the date that the FAFSA 2023-2024
 application will become available. Class of 2023 graduates should complete the FAFSA
 application for the year they'll first be enrolled in college or trade school.
- GET STARTED ON THE FAFSA. <u>This page</u> includes the 'How to Fill Out the FAFSA
 Form' video and 'Gathering the Documents Needed to Apply' list. A perfect resource to
 assist you to begin the FAFSA.
- EXPLORE SCHOLARSHIPS Scholarship awards often run in cycles and occur annually.
 Read your school's local scholarship board or website for annual scholarships regularly.
