



APPLICATION TYPES

EARLY AC

to apply before the regular deadline. If you're offered a place, you can accept right away or decide when you've received more offers. Some colleges offer EA I and EA II.

The EA II deadline is later than the EA I deadline.

EARLY DECISION

Early decision allows you to apply before the regular deadline. But if you're offered a place at the college, you must accept. Your application is binding. Some colleges offer ED I and ED II. The ED II deadline is later than the ED I deadline.

REGULAR DECISION

Regular decision
means you must
submit your
application by a
certain date. This date
is often set in January.
You can apply to more
than one college with
this option. You'll likely
hear back from the
college in March or
April.

ROLLING ADMISSION

This option allows you to apply to a college on any date. But spaces run out, so it's best to apply early! The college will review your application once it's received. You'll only have to wait a few weeks to find out if you got in or not.

APPLICATION TYPES - ON SITE ADMISSIONS

ON SITE ADMISSIONS

On site admissions allows you to meet with a representative in person, present your application and receive a decision that same day.








DIVISION I OR II

You need to be certified by the NCAA Eligibility Center to compete at an NCAA

Division I or II school. To create a **Certification Account**, go to

https://web3.ncaa.org/ecwr3/register/CERTIFICATION

If you need additional assistance your counselors can guide you through the process.

You need to create a Certification Account to make official visits to Divisions I and II schools or to sign a National Letter of Intent.

Letters of Recommendation

- We are currently accepting recommendations, there is a 10-day completion time and students will receive notification through email upon completion.
- Letter of recommendations submitted through email before October 20th, are available for submission for colleges accepting early admission.
- Letters are completed by order of submission.
- We will begin to accept requests for new letters of recommendations after October 19th starting on November 1
 - New requests will require a 10day completion time from the date they were requested through email.

Students must **email** to their counselor a sample letter of recommendation. They must be typed within in the body of the email, **do not use google docs**.

What to include in email when requesting a letter of recommendation

Each student's letter of recommendation will be unique to them, but there are a few things that are helpful for everyone to include.

- Your name and contact information
- Your school information (name, expected graduation date)
- Your GPA
- Three words to describe yourself
- What impact did you have at Renaissance
- Why should you receive the scholarship (If asking for a scholarship also include the name of the scholarship)
- Activities you have participated in and when
 - Academic clubs
 - Sports teams
 - Extracurricular clubs
 - Out-of-school clubs
- Leadership roles you have held
- Work experience and when
- Any awards you have won (academic, athletic, etc.)
- Your goals for the future as it relates to your college applications
- Additional notes or insights that may help them understand more about you

Who is eligible for the Detroit Promise?



- Graduated from a high school in Detroit and have a Detroit address.
- Detroit Promise funding is not competitive. Every student who registers and meets the requirements will receive funding.
- Four-year university funding
 - Requires high school seniors to have a 3.0 overall GPA
 - At least a 21 ACT or 1060 SAT exam score by April 30
 - Accepted into a participating four-year institution in Michigan.
 - There are select schools that will accept at 2.7GPA
- Two-year college funding
 - Neither a GPA nor exam score requirement
 - Supports eligible students for up to three years as they pursue a two-year degree or a technical certificate at a community college.
 - May take a gap year

Strategies for Winning Scholarships

- It's a numbers game
 - To win more scholarships, apply to more scholarships
 - One in four students never applies for financial aid
- Start searching as soon as possible (right now!)
 - If you wait until spring to start searching, you will miss deadlines
- Essays can be reused and tailored to the sponsor's goals
- Don't miss deadlines!
- Go into interviews prepared!
