Academic Subcommittee Recap

During the January Academic Subcommittee Meeting, Beth Gonzalez, Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction, presented on Social and Emotional Learning, a focus of the K-8 English language arts (ELA) curriculum. The District understands that Social and Emotional Learning is important for students as they develop their character. The District also supports this priority through the Stanford Harmony Curriculum for elementary students. A central goal of the curriculum is to help students become effective and ethical learners, so they can contribute to a better world. The goal of the intentional practices and lessons help students see other points of view, and teaches them to give meaningful feedback while learning the importance of standing up for others and what they believe in. With incorporating the intentional focus on character, students can become passionate about what they are learning because it's a connection to who they are as a person.



Rise Up, Read More

As outlined in our Blueprint 2020, outstanding achievement is one of the main priorities. There are many factors that impact student achievement, but literacy remains at the top of the list. In connection,

the Office of Literacy has developed a comprehensive independent reading plan called the "Rise Up, Read More Challenge," which includes quarterly competitions, end of the year celebrations, and ideas to support ongoing literacy development. Students are recording each book they complete in their District provided planner and are submitting reading reflections or written responses to their teachers.

Help a Student Achieve Success Through Let's Read



The District continues to make the exciting shift to the new and improved Michigan Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS). Students are now "figuring out" science opposed to simply memorizing the science that others have discovered. In Grade 9, many students are piloting the award-winning course,

Interactions. This course prepares our students for the new Science M-STEP as well as the next generation job force!

Ms. Kimberly Stevenson, from Davis Aerospace, explained that the *Interactions* curriculum "has equipped her students with the ability to discover knowledge on their own, which gives them a sense of pride and satisfaction that they wouldn't have normally [received] from a traditional classroom."

"This program has allowed me to actually see the theory and research behind NGSS come alive in my classroom," said Ms. Stevenson. "By incorporating Modeling and Talk Moves as a major part of my classroom environment, I have found my students to me more motivated and enthusiastic about their classwork. NGSS has offered my students a multi-faceted approach to learning that breaks up the monotony of the traditional teacher-centered classroom."

Elementary Chess Teams Will Go to Nationals



Bates Academy and Chrysler Elementary students played with grit and determination to win the 2019 Elementary State Chess Championship on February 2 at Palmer Park Preparatory Academy. Both teams tied for the Elementary State Championship, which featured top teams from Ann Arbor, Okemos, Troy, West Bloomfield, Canton, Grosse Pointe and Novi. Chrysler was leading most of the rounds until Bates Academy students came back at the end, taking the top spot by tiebreakers. All teams played five rounds for two hours for each game played. High School Curriculum Adoption for ELA and Math

A curriculum audit conducted for the District in 2017 revealed DPSCD's current instructional materials were misaligned to the demands of the Common Core State Standards (CCSS). DPSCD recognizes selecting new curriculum materials is a collaborative effort and involves the perspectives of key stakeholders. To select new curricula for high school English language arts (ELA) and math, the District assembled curriculum adoption committees with teachers and leaders from every high school. The committees convened, and reviewed materials provided by different publishers with the goal of making a final recommendation to the Board. In addition, DPSCD hosted Community Engagement sessions at four high schools, where approximately 300 students, teachers and community members conducted their own review of the proposed materials. Feedback from the Community Engagement sessions was provided for consideration to the curriculum adoption committees during the final day of the review process, at which both committees arrived at a final recommendation. The District will seek final approval at the Board of Education meeting scheduled for March 12, 2019 at 5:30 p.m. at Renaissance High School.

Teachers Gear up for Grade 3 Computer Science Lessons

The Office of Computer Science and Innovation recently hosted its first third-grade computer science workshop. The teachers in attendance, new pioneers of innovation, were given WeDo LEGO Robotics kits to use in their classrooms. During the workshop, teachers learned three concrete and innovative ways to apply computer science principles in their third-grade science classrooms. The lessons consisted of "Metamorphosis of a Frog Robot," "Plants and Pollinators," and "Flood Gate Lesson."

Teachers attended a follow-up workshop called Mission Moon hosted by First Robotics. Teachers who attended these workshops received Chromebooks provided by a \$115,000 donation from Google.





DPSCD Introduces New History Curriculum



DPSCD released its new Detroit History curriculum for students in kindergarten through fifth-grade this past February, just in time for Black History Month. Students will learn how the city was built as well as learn about the sacrifices, achievements, and key historical events, such as the great fire of 1805.

"The sense of urgency behind this initiative was to ensure that our students understood the history of their city, which is directly linked to their identity," said Nikolai Vitti, Superintendent, DPSCD. "That history is powerful with examples of achievement and struggle. Too often the teaching of history negates the local context and the immediate experiences of our families and neighborhoods. Local history makes learning relevant and empowering. It activates citizenship!"
