Board Recognizes Students and Teachers Who Exemplify District Core Values

One of DPSCD's Core Values is putting Student's First. It was among the precepts lauded by the Board of Education as members recognized several students and staff during the Regular Board of Education meeting on Tuesday, March 8, 2022.

To start, the Board welcomed its recently elected Student Representatives: Brooke Snow, a senior at Detroit School of Arts (DSA); Emerson Jeffries, a senior at Cass Technical High School and Perriel Pace, a sophomore at Legacy Academy, she will serve as the alternate. The students will participate in upcoming board discussions and provide a student perspective in its decision making.

"We went through interviews, planning discussions as well as submitting essays," said Pace, following her introduction by Board of Education Secretary Misha Stallworth. "We are very excited to be working with the Board and have a chance to speak for our peers."

The trio will serve until the end of the 2022-23 school year.

Meanwhile, <u>Breithaupt Career Technical Center</u> teachers Tanisha Bronaugh and Rickey Simmons were recognized by the Board for putting Students First through their work in Breithaupt's Automotive Services career pathway. Each teacher inspired and positively influenced several current and former students to pursue their passion to work and advance themselves in the industry.

Board Actions

As part of its administrative work, the Board approved all Consent Agenda items following their extensive review, discussion, and approval at the committee level. The Board also urged the community to participate in the ongoing Facility Master Plan (FMP) engagement sessions.
